In 2007 after earning a BA/BM in Music Education with Certification from the University of Washington, Lee traveled to South India to study Carnatic saxophone with Dr. Kadri Gopalnath. Kadri is the only man in South India accepted by the Carnatic community as a master of the music on saxophone. Lee has continued to travel the world collecting melodies, scales, and rhythms to expand his repertoire.
